Adams, Frank, Gary Hansen. **Putting Democracy to Work: A Practical Guide for Starting and Managing Worker-Owned Businesses.** San Francisco: Berrett-Koehler Publishers, 1992.

The authors offer comprehensive guidelines on how to develop a business plan, methods of financing, various legal structures, management, and decision-making patterns for worker owned cooperatives. There are also useful tools and case studies that can be helpful in starting the foundation for a worker-owned entity.

Curl, John. **For All the People: Uncovering the Hidden History of Cooperation, Cooperative Movements, and Communalism in America.** Oakland, CA: PM Press, 2009.

This book provides a history of cooperatives in America with particular focus on worker-owned cooperatives. It documents the multi-generational struggle of the American working people for social justice through the cooperative movement.

Osterwalder, Alexander, Yves Pigneur. **Business Model Generation.** Hoboken, NJ: John Wiley & Son, Inc., 2010.

The authors define rationale of how an organization creates, delivers, and captures value by offering a variety of tools and techniques for designing a valuable business model. The book explains the most common business patterns that are based on examples from leading companies in the country.

Restakis explores a rich history of the powerful, grassroots co-operative movement and provides an in-depth look at real-world examples of organizing for change.
